New cashew processor gets cracking in Benin

Afokantan Benin Cashew SA will start processing Beninese cashew nuts this September. This is the first big private project in cashew for the past 3 decades in the country. Mr. Abou Bakr Adjibade, director and shareholder of the company, worked very hard to launch this cashew cracking plant. Benin, with an increasing cashew production will now also house significant cashew processing. This initiative, started with the help of PSOM, an investment program of the Dutch government, will enable future set-up of more factories by other interested parties in Benin, creating numerous jobs, a more positive economic environment and a higher export value on cashew nuts. Furthermore, the anticipated spin-off should enable growers to have better returns and better growing support over the years to come. Afocantan is set to process 1,500 to 2,000 tons of cashew nuts into highquality cashew nut kernels for the international as well as the domestic market under the brand name: Pride of Africa, Benin!

Export of raw cashews in Guinea-Bissau

More than 70% of this country's exports consists of cashew nuts. According to Mama Samba Embalo, President of the National Agriculture Association (ANAG), about 1 million farmers produce 100,000-120,000 tons of cashews a year. Guinea-Bissau cashews are well known for good quality; they have a KOR (kernel output ratio) of 52-54. However, the cashew sector faces some major challenges. Trans-



port is one issue. The harbor needs to be dredged, the fairway marked with buoys, infrastructure and warehousing renovated. Another one is the insufficient competition for Guinea Bissau cashews. Many buyers have not come back this year to source their cashews from Guinea Bissau. Last year many nuts could not be dried properly and had become moldy upon arrival at buyers side. On top of this, worldwide consumer prices of cashew dropped 20% in 2006. Meanwhile cashew production in-

nin on September 13th in Cotonou. As in most West-African countries, the latest cashew season has revealed some serious challenges in the organization of exports in the sector. This will be one of the topics we'll discuss , as well as financing of cashew production and processing.

Senegal study on cashew

value chain Senegal is estimated to have a cashew production of 10,000-15,000 tons (mainly in the Southern part of the country). It's cashew value chain is currently mapped out by USAID's Economic Growth Program "SAGIC", a partner of ACA, which will focus on better organization of the sector and improvement of the quality of raw nuts. This study will helping identify country-wide priorities.

creased (Cote d'Ivoire doubled its production in the last few

vears). This all has had its effect on the demand for - and pricing of - the nuts. Government tax has further decreased farm gate prices. Farmers received prices of \$0.20 to \$ 0.30 per kg raw cashews at their gate, compared to +/- \$0,50 per kg last year. The importance of the cashew nut sector in Guinea Bissau, and the numerous, complex challenges it is currently facing, call for an urgent collaborative approach between all stakeholders. The ACA is committed to initiate and facilitate needed action.
